CHILDREN AT THIS AGE >>>

How They Understand the New Commandment Loving God above all things and loving others as God loves us may sound simple to a child this age—until it comes to practical applications. We are often tested in these commands by the things we get most excited about or the people we are with every day. Your child will need many reminders of how he or she can apply these principles in daily life choices. For example, he or she might choose to go to church rather than staying home to play a video game or make a choice to not fight with a friend or sibling.



CONSIDER THIS >>>

How difficult is it to show kindness to someone who has harmed you?

Forgiveness may be the greatest challenge in our spiritual journey. It is sometimes difficult to imagine how people can let go of the resentment and bitterness they feel when they are wronged. Yet, "the best way to obtain mercy is to be merciful. As Jesus taught us, 'Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy' (Mt 5, 7). Failure to forgive others is a major human problem. Holding grudges is common. Failure to forgive routinely tears apart families, neighborhoods, and even nations. Jesus stressed mercy and forgiveness in numerous ways" (USCCA, p. 488).

- Ask your child to name some times when he or she has asked forgiveness from someone else. How did it feel to receive that forgiveness?
