CHILDREN AT THIS AGE >>>

How They Understand Healing and Reconciliation For children at this age, right and wrong are deeper concepts than

they were before. Morality is not just about what other people see us doing. It is also about who we are and what we do when no one seems to be watching. It is important that as children grow in their ability to form their consciences, they have continued opportunity to seek God's forgiveness through the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation



CONSIDER THIS >>>

Have you ever yearned for a relationship to be healed?

We are human, and are not perfect. Our egos or hurt feelings can get in the way of healing a relationship. Yet, God loves perfectly and offers forgiveness to all who have not loved as he asked and therefore hurt ourselves, others, and our relationship with him. As Catholics, we know that "sin should never be understood as a private or personal matter, because it harms our relationship with others and may even break our loving communion with the Church. The Sacrament of Penance repairs this break and has a renewing effect of the vitality of the Church itself" (USCCA, p. 242).

LET'S TALK >>>

- Ask your child to name the parts of the Sacrament of Reconciliation (contrition, confession, penance, absolution).
- Discuss how your family shares God's healing love with one another.
