CHILDREN AT THIS AGE >>>

How They Understand the Kingdom of God The Kingdom of God is an abstract concept that may be difficult for children at this age, who are just beginning to have the capacity to think more figuratively. This is particularly true of the paradoxes we traditionally hold by faith about the Kingdom—that the Kingdom is now and is also yet to be, that it is on Earth and also in Heaven. The parables of the Kingdom are useful for children this age in that they can continue to draw new meanings from these stories over time as they are ready.



CONSIDER THIS >>>

Did your parents ever say to you, “Do as I say, not as I do”?

For Jesus, there was no difference between what he said and what he did. His words and actions were one, and both made God's Kingdom present. As Catholics, we understand that “the proclamation of the Kingdom of God was fundamental to Jesus' preaching. The Kingdom of God is his presence among human beings calling them to a new way of life as individuals and as a community. . . . It is the Good News that results in love, justice, and mercy for the whole world. The Kingdom is realized partially on earth and permanently in heaven” (*USCCA, pp. 79-80*).

- Read together a favorite parable about the Kingdom of God.
